Druffel denied the injunc-

tion because the board here officially favored integration and had a construction program underway which would make it practical to accomplish in two years. The judge held that the injunction would upset the school system.

In the briefs, the NAACP attorneys claim that the district judge bowed to convenience rather than weighing the facts and considering the law in the case. The attorneys contended further that the judge gave consideration to community hostility "to minority groups and allowed it to take precedence over the law."

Tax Books Open For June Payment

W. L. Robison, county treasurer, said today that tax books are now open for collection of the June or second-half installment of real estate taxes in this county.

The treasurer said that books will remain open for this collection until June 20, but he urged local residents who have not yet paid the last installment to pay them soon to avoid a last minute rush.

No tax statement will be mailed to taxpayers on this installment, since both the first and last half bills were included in the statement received by the taxpayers at the first of the year.

Many real estate owners paid both the first and second installments at the same time, the treasurer noted.

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
